## Brief Introduction to the Tourist Spots

Kyoto's Sanzen-in Temple, located in the serene Ohara area, is a historic Tendai sect temple founded in the 8th century. It's renowned for its beautiful moss garden with countless small stone statues, lush greenery, and seasonal flowers. The temple's Shinden Hall offers peaceful views of the garden, especially stunning during autumn foliage and early summer hydrangea season.

Kifune Shrine

Kifune Shrine is dedicated to the god of water and is a sacred site for praying for rain and marital happiness. The shrine complex consists of the Main Hall, Inner Shrine, and Middle Shrine, spread along a valley path. Visitors can explore these structures by following a stone stairway path, lined with dotted red lanterns and accompanied by the murmuring sounds of a stream, creating a tranquil and sacred atmosphere.

Kinkaku-ji Temple was a villa owned by the Muromachi-era shogunate General Takashi Yoshimitsu, which was later converted into a Zen temple. The outer wall of its core building, Sheli Hall, was covered with gold foil. It was burned down in 1950 and rebuilt a few years later, and continued its brilliant gold appearance.

The most remarkable feature of Fushimi Inari Taisha is the Senbon Torii. Along the long mountain path, there are countless bright red torii gates standing tall. The Senbon Torii was also the filming location for the movie "Memoirs of a Geisha".
